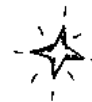

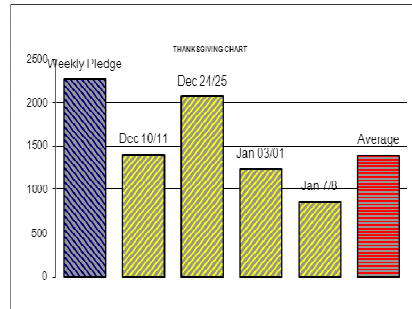

Feast Days of the Week

Mon 17 Jan St Anthony of Egypt (251-356)

After the death of his wealthy
landowner parents Anthony, at
the age of 34, felt called to follow
the words of Jesus: 'Go, sell what
you have and give to the poor,
and come, follow Me.' From then
on he spent his time living the life
of a desert hermit. He is notable
for being one of the first ascetics
to attempt living in the desert
proper, completely cut off from
civilization – and has hence been
called 'the founder of Christian
monasticism'.

Fri 21 Jan St Agnes

Virgin and Martyr (Third
Century)

St Agnes, a Roman girl, was
thirteen years old when she
suffered martyrdom for her faith.
She had consecrated herself to
God saying, "Jesus Christ is my
only Spouse." On her feast day,
two lambs are blessed at her
church in Rome, and then their
wool is woven into the palliums
(bands of white wool) which the
Pope confers on archbishops as a
symbol of their jurisdiction.
